#### Title I – Policy and Administration

## Article XII Public Library and Board of Trustees

- 1-12.1 PURPOSE: This ordinance establishes a public library for the City of Salem, to be known as the Crew Public Library.
- 1-12.2 PUBLIC LIBRARY: The Crew Public Library is established and created for the use by the inhabitants of the City of Salem. Such library shall consist of all materials including, but not limited to books, papers, maps, and manuscripts, or other media, together with all real and other personal property acquired for library purposes.
- 1-12.3 LIBRARY TRUSTEES: The Board of Trustees of the Library, hereinafter referred to as the Board, shall consist of five (5) members. At least three (3), but no more than four (4) shall be residents of the City. One (1) member, but no more than two (2) non-resident members shall be non-residents of the City, but residents of the unincorporated areas of Salem lying within Henry County. All members shall be over the age of eighteen (18) years.

**Appointments of Trustees:** All members are to be appointed by the Mayor, by and with the approval of the City Council.

- 1-12.5 ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD: The organization of the Board shall be as follows:
  - Term of Office: All appointments to the Board shall be for six (6) years, except to fill vacancies. Each
    term shall commence on July 1. No member shall serve more than two consecutive full terms on the
    Board.
  - 2.) Appointments shall be made every two (2) years of one-third (1/3) the total number or as near as possible, to stagger the terms.
  - 3.) Vacancies: The position of any Trustee shall be vacated if such member resigns, moves permanently from the City (or county in the case of a non-resident); or if a trustee is absent from six (6) consecutive regular meetings of the Board, except in the case of sickness or temporary absence from the City.
    - Vacancies in the Board shall be filled by the Mayor by and with the approval of the City Council. The new Trustee shall fill out the unexpired term for which the appointment is made.
- 1-12.6 Compensation. Trustees shall receive no compensation for their services. This does not preclude reimbursement for expenses incurred, such as training and associated mileage. POWERS AND DUTIES: The Board shall have and exercise the following powers and duties in order to direct and control all affairs of the Library. The Library, although autonomous in many ways, is an agency of the City, and is subject to all aspects of state law governing municipal entities, including lowa Code Chapters 21 regarding Open Meetings and 22, regarding Open Records.
  - TO MEET AND ORGANIZE BY ELECTION from one of their number a president, and by election a secretary of the board, and other officers as the Board may deem necessary. The warrant writing officer for the Library is the City Clerk.
  - TO KEEP A RECORD OF ITS PROCEEDINGS.

#### 3. PERSONNEL:

<u>Hiring of Personnel</u>: To employ a Library Director, and authorize the hiring of such assistants and employees as may be necessary for the proper management of the Library (excluding custodial services), and to set their compensation. The range of compensation for each position shall be set prior to hiring, and approved by a majority of the appointed board. The Library Director, or their designee, shall report to the Board at all meetings, but is not a voting member of the board.

All library employees are City employees therefore, all City Employee Personnel Policies are binding upon them-

<u>Removal of Personnel</u>. To remove the librarian, by a two-thirds vote of the Board (four of the five members), and provide procedures for the removal of the assistants or employees for misdemeanor, incompetence or inattention to duty, subject to the provisions of Chapter 35C of the Code of Iowa.

- 4. <u>POLICIES</u>: To develop, approve, and adopt policies, which may be drafted by the Library Director, as needed, not inconsistent with State Law, including those needed to meet public library standards as established by the State Library of lowa.
- 5. <u>PURCHASES:</u> To authorize the librarian to select, and make purchases of books, pamphlets, magazines, periodicals, papers, maps, journals, other Library materials, (see 1-12.2), furniture, fixtures, stationery and supplies for the Library within budgetary limits set by the Board as approved by the Council for Fiscal Year.

#### TO ESTABLISH OUTSIDE RELATIONSHIPS:

<u>Historical Associations</u>. To have authority to make agreements with the local or county historical associations where such exist, and to set apart the necessary room and to care for such articles as may come into the possession of the association, as necessary. The Trustees are further authorized to purchase necessary receptacles and materials for the preservation and protection of such articles as are in their judgment of a historical and educational nature and pay for the same out of funds allocated for Library purposes.

<u>Use by Nonresidents</u>: To authorize the use of the Library by nonresidents and to fix charges therefore unless a contract for free service exists in any one or more of the following ways:

- Lending: By lending the books or other materials of the Library to nonresidents on the same terms and conditions as to residents of the City, or County, or upon payment of a special nonresident Library fee.
- Depository: By establishing depositories of Library books or other materials to be loaned to nonresidents.
- Bookmobiles. By establishing bookmobiles or a traveling library so that books or other Library materials may be loaned to nonresidents.
- Branch Library. By establishing branch libraries for lending books or other Library materials to nonresidents.
- Library materials shall be considered books, digital media, or any other materials.

<u>Contracting With Other Libraries</u>: The Board may contract with any other boards of trustees of free public libraries, with any other city, school, private or semiprivate organization, institution of higher learning, township, or County, or with the trustees of any County library district for the use of the Library by their respective residents.

Such a contract may be terminated at any time by mutual consent of the contracting parties. It also may be terminated by a majority vote of the electors represented by either of the contracting parties. Such a termination proposition shall be submitted to the electors by the governing body of a contracting party on a written petition of not less than five percent (5%) in number of the electors who voted for governor in the territory of the contracting party at the last general election. The petition must be presented to the governing body not less than forty (40) days before the election. The proposition may be submitted at any election provided by law that is held in the territory of the party seeking to terminate the contract.

7. GIFTS: To accept donations, gifts of real, personal, or mixed property, devises and bequests, including trust funds; to take the title to said property in the name of the City; to execute deeds and bills of sales for the conveyance of said property, and to expend the funds received from all such gifts or donations for exclusive use for the improvement and operation of the Library. Such funds shall be held in a separate account by the City, to be known as the Library Sustaining Account, such fund to be overseen by the Library Board of Trustees., in accordance with city and state laws and regulations regarding the investment of public funds.

To enforce the performance of conditions on gifts, donations, devises and bequests accepted by the City on behalf of the Library by action against the City Council.

8. <u>BUDGET</u>: To develop, in conjunction with the Library Director, an annual budget for the library to be submitted to the City Council by January, with finalized budget included in the total City Budget submitted to the County and State in March. The budget provided to the Council should include all anticipated needs and expenses for operation and maintenance of the library including general city expenses allocated as appropriate (State Code 336.13), along with all anticipated revenue sources, including those from donations, grants, and other sources, including any transfers from the existing Library Sustaining Account.

After final approval of the Library Budget by the City Council, the Library Board of Trustees will have exclusive control over expenditures: Expenditures shall be paid for only on the order of the Board, signed by its President and Secretary, and submitted along with receipts to the City Clerk, the warrant writing officer for the City, for payment.

The Council may disapprove payment for such expenditures if and only if such expenditures will exceed the total amount of the approved budget. The City Council does not have line-item approval, or disproval of individual expenditures.

Transfers to the City's operating account for the library will be made on a quarterly basis from the General Fund and from the Library Sustaining Account so that the City Clerk may issue checks for items approved by the Library Board of Trustees.

- 9. <u>PHYSICAL PLANT</u>: The Board has charge, control, and supervision of the Library, its appurtenances, fixtures, and rooms containing the same.
- 10. <u>STRATEGIC PLANNING</u>: To develop a strategic plan that will enable the library to continue to serve the community as an essential resource for education, for intellectual curiosity, for recreational activities including movies and pleasure reading, as a community gathering place, reflecting the changing needs and desires of the community.
- 11. <u>ANNUAL REPORT:</u> The Board shall make a report to the Council within 90 days of the close of the fiscal year (which ends June 30). This report shall include:
  - Summary of the activity in the library during the previous year, including the number of books and other media added, the number circulated, the amount of fines collected, and other measurements of activity by the library.
  - A comparison of anticipated budget versus actual expenses.
  - A comparison of this activity to historical usage.
  - Comments on strategies for future programs and increased engagement with the public.
  - The condition of the Library.
  - Other information as required by the Council.
- 1-12-7: Injury to books, other media, and property: It is unlawful to a person to willfully or maliciously injure, or destroy material, or to improperly remove material from the library, and such persons may be detained by a police officer or a person employed in a facility containing such library materials, in accordance with lowa Code section 714.5 and 808.12.
- 1.12-8: Repealer: All ordinances of parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**1.12-9:** Severability Clause: If any section, provision, or part of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or constitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part not adjudged invalid or constitutional.

**EFFECTIVE DATE:** This Ordinance shall be in effect after its final passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

#### **Public Notice:**

Ordinance No I-XII Public Library and Board of Trustees (Summary)

The residents of Salem, by a vote of 71 in favor and 19 against, approved by referendum vote on November 2, 2021, the enactment of an Ordinance in accordance with Iowa Code 392.5(1) and (3) establishing the composition and manner of selection of Library Board Trustees, with all members to be appointed by the mayor subject to city Council approval. Based thereon, the Salem City Council proposed and approved Ordinance No. I-XII (1-12), Entitled "Public Library and Board of Trustees", with the final reading being approved at the regular Salem City council meeting held on January 4<sup>th</sup>, 2022. This notice shall provide a summary of the ordinance as permitted by Iowa Code Section 380.7. The essential elements of the ordinance are as follows: The library shall be known as the Crew Library, it shall be governed by a five (5) member board with board members to be appointed by the mayor with the approval of the City Council, with at least three (3) being residents of the City of Salem, and at least one (1) but no more than two (2) being residents of the unincorporated area of Salem lying within Henry County. The ordinance describes the organization, power and duties of the board, and includes other terms and provisions

related to the operation of the public library. The provisions of the Ordinance, but for the provisions tied to the make-up and appointment process of the Board, are substantially consistent with the draft ordinance introduced by the State Library of Iowa after home rule was established in 1972, same believed to be consistent with the last approved City of Salem Library Ordinance.
